What is a proper noun?

A proper noun is a noun for people, places (countries, cities, etc.), months, and days. It starts with a capital letter. Generally, there is no article before.

Examples:

Steve (first name)

Mr. Smith (last name)

Japan (country)

London (city)

March (month)

Wednesday (day)
